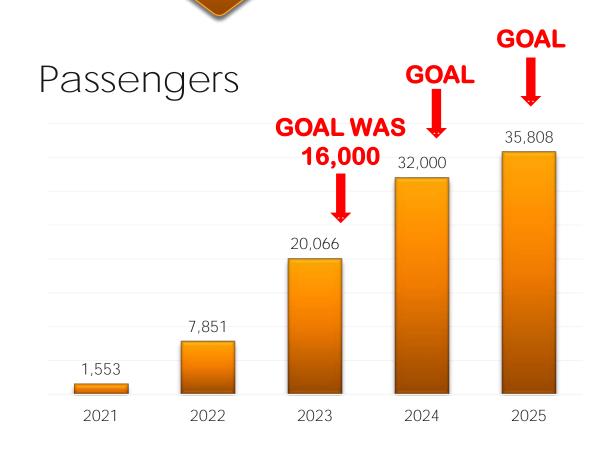

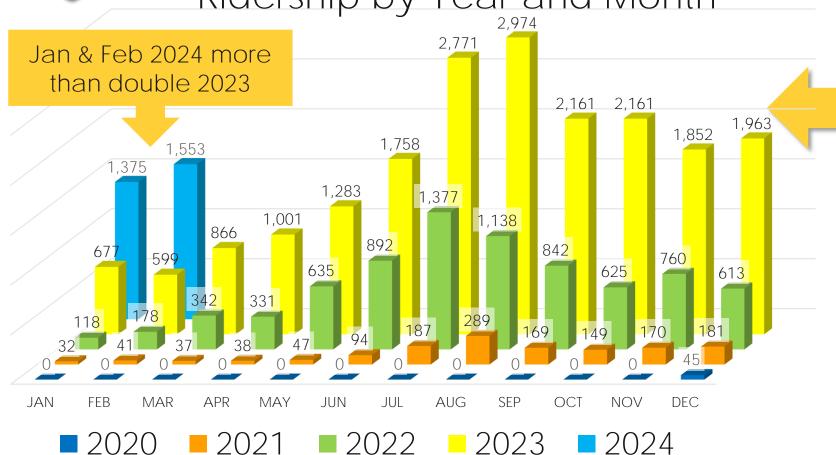


RIDERSHIP GROWTH 1,192% SINCE 2021



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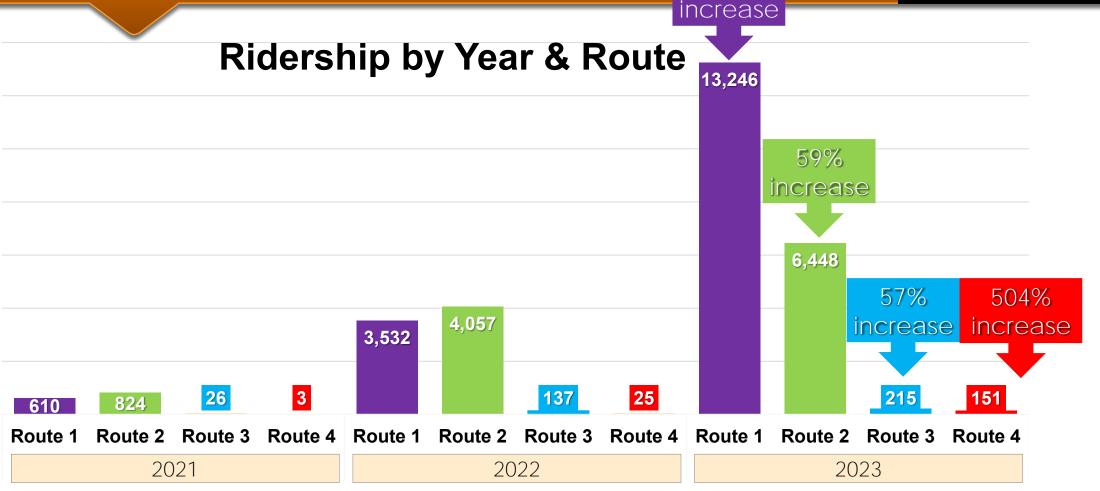

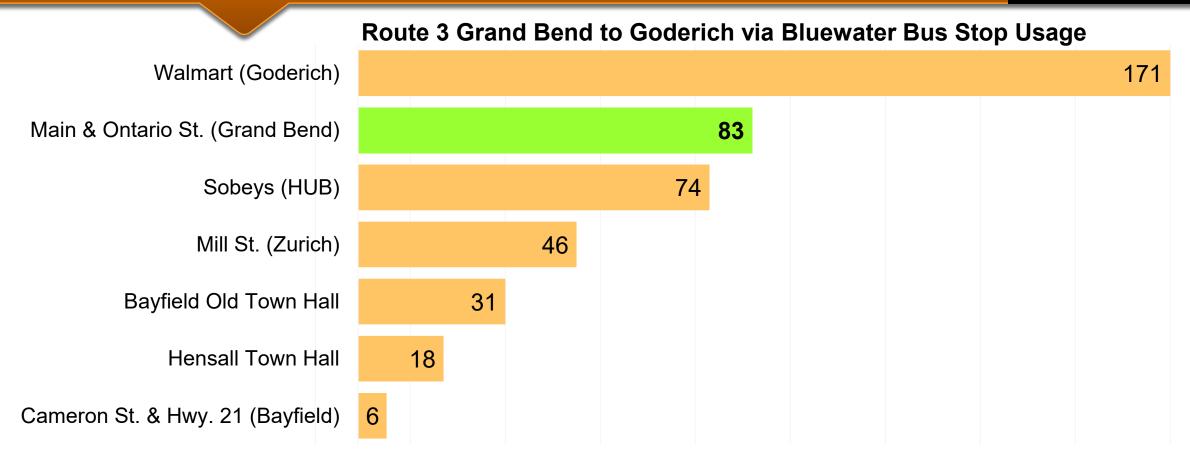

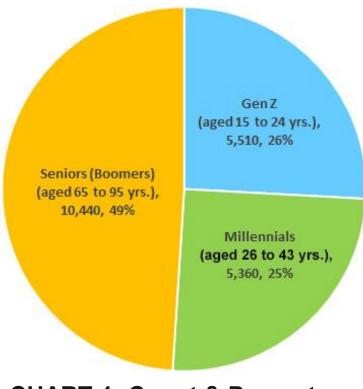


CHART 1: Count & Percentage in **HSAT service area**

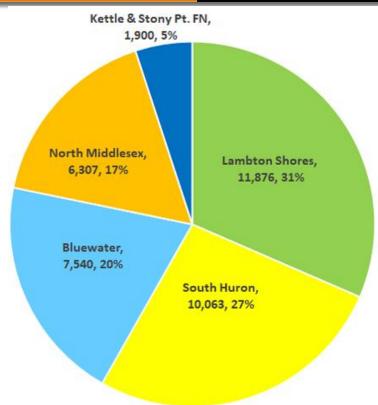


CHART 2: Count & Percentage by Municipality / First Nation

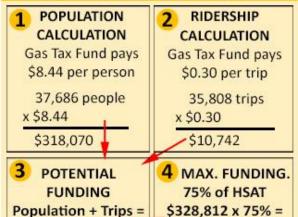
